Mary's Munchies: Quick Praline Bars

24 Graham cracker squares

1/2 cup packed brown sugar

1/2 cup (1 stick margarine or butter)

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup chopped pecans

- 1. Heat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 2. Arrange graham crackers in single layer in ungreased jelly roll pan, 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1 inch.
- 3. Heat brown sugar and margarine to boiling in 2quart saucepan. Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly; remove from heat. Stir in vanilla.

4. Pour sugar mixture over crackers; spread evenly. Sprinkle with pecans. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until bubbly; cool slightly.

Makes about 2 dozen – Enjoy!

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The Hummingbird Puzzle is finished!


